



ON SITE

AT THE VOGELSANG 'INTERNATIONAL PLACE'

The Eifel National Park Centre is located in a highly unusual place. From 1934, the National Socialists established the 'Ordensburg Vogelsang' estate here. Following World War II, the territory was first a British and then a Belgian military training area. Today it is an international meeting place and education centre, which stands for tolerance, open-mindedness and a respectful approach to nature. At the heart of the site – the Forum Vogelsang IP – you can learn about the region, enjoy a snack in the café, and visit two exhibitions: the interactive 'Dreams of the wilderness' exhibition, and the Nazi documentation of the history of the site.


THE SOURROUNDINGS

IN THE EIFEL NATIONAL PARK

The National Park Centre offers panoramic views over the Urftsee reservoir in the heart of the Eifel National Park.

Woods, water, wilderness – this is the motto of the first National Park in the state of North Rhine-Westphalia. Near-natural beech and oak forests, brooks, rivers and areas of open grassland provide for a varied view into and beyond the immediate landscape. A hiking or cycling tour is always an attractive option in combination with a visit to the exhibition.

GETTING HERE

By public transport

Take National Park bus no. SB 82 from Kall railway station or bus no. SB 63 from Aachen via Einruhr (bus stop 'Vogelsang IP Forum') www.vrsinfo.de, www.av.de

By car/coach

Take the main B 266 road to the address 'Vogelsang 70, 53937 Schleiden'. There is a charge (€ 4) for parking in the visitors' car park after the first 30 minutes.

On foot and by bike

The National Park Centre is on various hiking and cycling routes and is thus ideal as a stopping-off point on your tour. Coordinates: N 50°35'10.6", O 6°26'52.1"

You can use all of your senses to experience the fully accessible 'Dreams of the wilderness' exhibition. The entire exhibition area, including the sanitary facilities, is freely accessible for wheel chairs and pushchairs. Plenty of seating is on offer throughout. There are both tactile and auditory guiding systems available. The main content of the exhibition is explained in German, English, French and Dutch. There are also simplified language, raised type and Braille versions (all in German only). Media guides can be borrowed, providing information in several languages, including German sign language.

What does the Eifel National Park mean to you?



over the course of time!*





Tomorrow's primary forests

Central European beech forests are globally unique! Their main area is in Germany. In the Eifel National Park, the forest is no longer exploited for commercial purposes. It can thus develop slowly and undisturbed into the 'virgin forests of tomorrow', offering a habitat to all sorts of different species.

How many species live in the (virgin) beech forest?
Where exactly are they?
How do they share their habitat?

Water worlds

Spring, brook or reservoir: water is a key element in the Eifel National Park. Dynamic biospheres line the river from source to confluence. They offer a retreat, a hunting ground and a nursery to many different species.

Who built the dams?
